**(Partial Agreement)**

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RESOLUTION AP-CSP (02) 6

*(adopted by the Public Health Committee (Partial Agreement) (CD-P-SP)  
on 16 December 2002)*

The Public Health Committee (Partial Agreement) (CD-P-SP) consisting, for the purposes of the Convention on the Elaboration of a European Pharmacopoeia, of delegations appointed by the Parties to the said Convention, namely the delegations of Austria, Belgium, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Croatia, Cyprus, the Czech Republic, Denmark, Estonia, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Hungary, Iceland, Ireland, Italy, Latvia, Luxembourg, the Netherlands, Norway, Portugal, the Slovak Republic, Slovenia, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, "the Former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia", Turkey, the United Kingdom, the Federal Republic of Yugoslavia and the European Community,

Considering that, under Article 1 of the Convention, the parties have undertaken progressively to elaborate a Pharmacopoeia which shall be common to the countries concerned and which shall be entitled « European Pharmacopoeia », and to take the necessary measures to ensure that the monographs constituting the European Pharmacopoeia shall become official standards applicable within their respective countries;

Having regard to Article 4, paragraph 3, of the Convention, which makes the Public Health Committee responsible for fixing the time-limits within which decisions of a technical character relating to the European Pharmacopoeia shall be implemented within the territories of the respective Parties;

Having regard to the recommendation adopted on 14 November 2002 by the European Pharmacopoeia Commission, in accordance with the provision of Article 6, paragraph d of the Convention, which concerns the fixing of the date on which the monograph *Lypressini solutio iniectabilis* (0506), shall cease to form part of the European Pharmacopoeia,

Resolves to set at 1 July 2003 the date on which the monograph *Lypressini solutio iniectabilis* (0506) shall cease to form part of the European Pharmacopoeia.
