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### **Note for the Editors**

The European Pharmacopoeia and the EDQM (a Directorate of the Council of Europe notably in charge of the secretariat of the European Pharmacopoeia) have a mission to protect and promote public and animal health, through the elaboration of quality standards of medicines for human and veterinary use.

Medicines need to be safe, effective and of good quality in order to produce the expected therapeutic effect. The EDQM works closely with its international and European partners to strengthen measures in order to ensure that substandard or counterfeit medicines do not reach the marketplace.

The EDQM's networks collaborate on a daily basis with all the authorities involved in the standardisation, regulation and control of medicines for human and veterinary use. Since December 2006, the EDQM took over activities of the Council of Europe in the domains of blood transfusion and organ transplantation.

### **MOLDOVA BECOMES OBSERVER TO THE EUROPEAN PHARMACOPOEIA COMMISSION**

Moldova requested and obtained observer status to the European Pharmacopoeia Commission. The decision comes after receiving written confirmation from the delegates of the Commission and the European Union. This decision allows the development of additional cooperation with the authorities of this country.

There are currently thirty-seven members<sup>1</sup> of the European Pharmacopoeia Commission and twenty-one observers<sup>2</sup>.

The Convention on the Elaboration of a European Pharmacopoeia is an international Convention drafted by the Council of Europe in 1964. It has the objective of progressively elaborating a European pharmacopoeia that is common to all the member states and which defines a single set of specifications of official status applicable within these countries for active substances and excipients used in medicines; the European Pharmacopoeia also describes test methods to ensure the quality of these medicines.
